

Happy New Year church family!

New year rings in so much anticipation. Studies show that on January 1st, about 41% of adults in the U.S. set resolutions and only 9% of that sum achieves the resolutions they set. I don't know about you, but I am one of the 'other' 59%. How about you? Are you a New Year resolution person? How was 2023 for you? Did you achieve all that you set for 2023? Do you have plans for 2024? For me, I do have plans for the new year, but I also like to look back on 2023 and consider the thread of God's faithfulness and His fingerprints in my life, my family, and my ministry. The prophet Jeremiah



puts it this way; "Stop at the crossroad and look around. Ask for the old, godly way, and walk in it. Travel its path, and you will find rest for your souls." I am celebrating what God did for our ministry in 2023. We were able to confirm 9 of our youth to be full members of our church. We continued with our tradition of leading the sunrise service and our youth group did a great job; they were greeters, they read scripture, they shared homilies about the resurrection, and helped Pastor Reuben with holy communion. In the summer, our youth attended a denomination wide youth conference in Daytona Beach, Florida. All 30 of us that attended had a great time and this experience will be a story that will forever stay with all of us. At the Great Plains annual conference, our youth group was again recognized for being the hands and feet of Jesus not only in our community but shining the light of Christ among the nations through the many missions that we love to take part in. One of our youth members received the auspicious Harry Denman Evangelism award at the conference.

Our ministry completed a total of four different curriculums from the Seedbed Publishing House. Our Adventurers and Power Pack students all achieved many of our goals by memorizing weekly scripture and reciting creeds. I am proud of what God has done among our young people and what he continues to do this year and the many years to come. For our middle and high schoolers, they continue to impress us with their boldness in reading scripture during worship service and some of them have stepped up to do more by leading worship and preaching the Word. As for our missions, God continues to open up the hearts of our community and church families to provide for the needs of our ministry. We cannot thank our church family enough for the many prayers and support for our fundraising events throughout last year. We raised 168% over our goal during Match Day and packed more than double of our goal for Operation Christmas Child. All the shoeboxes that were packed last year are being sent to Burundi and Zambia. We also adopted a maintenance platoon from Fort Riley that was deployed in Europe.

I pray that the seeds we are planting today will give shade and rest to those coming after us. Thank you so much to all of our church family for your giving heart and intentionally seeking to make our community and the world around us a better place for the younger generation to come. May we continue to be the people of God that seeks His presence in this new year.


